Today more than ever our lives are dominated by the illusion that the world of TV and the Internet presents – fake news is everywhere, easy access to pornography on the web terrifies parents, and the advertising industry will follow us to the grave to get its message across; selling war, factory farming and statins. Film is of course illusion too, because it tricks the eye – however, we suspend disbelief and willingly enter the illusion hoping to find pleasure or enlightenment.

Guth Gafa has for the last twelve years provided a kind of antidote, a forum for filmmakers from across the world to set the record straight. This year the music phenomenon **Punk Voyage** pushes intellectual disability to centre stage, and rocks the audience; **The Cleaners** lifts the lid on the social media we thought were free of bias, and **Genesis 2.0** examines genetic engineering – species to order.

The documentaries we screen at Guth Gafa also depend on a kind of illusion: ideas that swim upstream without seeking profit; progressive ideas out of focus because they are out of time – because their time has not yet come. These films are the answer to the inflammatory rhetoric of the right wing – **The Breadwinner** shouts from the screen: Stop the bombing... **Island of Hungry Ghosts** calls out: Your law is unjust and **Eating Animals** demands: Look, look at how you wreck our planet!

And some films are quieter, seducing by beauty or harmony – gentle parables that give us hope, like: **Jane**, the charming portrait of the young anthropologist Jane Goodall, and **The Deminer** – a story of a man who gave his life to free Iraq from the scourge of landmines.

Guth Gafa is a celebration of the vision shared by these brave filmmakers to support and defend human rights – please join us.

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

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
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### A MOTHER BRINGS HER SON TO BE SHOT

Sinéad O'Shea, Ireland, 2017, 84'  
Sunday 22nd July, 5.30pm

It seems inconceivable that a mother would tolerate an assault on her own child, but Sinéad O'Shea's poignant film about The Troubles throws light on the distortions war brings — with family the first casualty. To exercise civic control, the RA meters out justice on the street and in this case the sentence is a non-fatal punishment shooting for a boy's misbehaviour. Failure to accept this judgement would bring certain death. What should a mother do; what would any parent do? Having to make this choice, in a sense sums up the conflict in Northern Ireland, where more often than not there is no right answer.

## A POLAR YEAR

Samuel Collardey, France, 2017, 94'

### IRISH PREMIERE

Anders Hvidegaard chooses a tiny remote outpost over the capital for his teaching post in Greenland – he's seeking adventure and relief from his bland Danish life. Conditions in the icebound village are severe, the pupils ungovernable, and the cultural differences such a yawning chasm, that Anders fears his choice was a mistake. But the 'blow-in' has a kind of exotic value and before long the community have tempered their view of the Dane and begin to include him in their lives – but on their terms. What Anders finds in the small fishing village is so unexpected, so beyond his experience that it forces him to question his place in the world and the role of Denmark as Greenland's custodian. It's the young teacher who ultimately has a lesson to learn; apart from igloo building, sledding and Polar Bear hunting.

### IRISH PREMIERE

Caught in a debt trap Marish lives a slave existence tending to an employer who effectively owns her; through the debt she owes. Verbally abused the timid woman has lost her sense of self in the face of the daily drudgery of cooking, washing, cleaning - all without pay. The hard-working Marish attends to every command without a whimper but in private reflects on a life seemingly wasted. Without her ID and not a penny to her name the 53 year old must surely continue on this treadmill until death or sacking. But bearing witness to the wickedness of slavery through the film has given Marish courage, and an idea takes root inside her – she could be free...

## BECOMING WHO I WAS

### IRISH PREMIERE

In the Tibetan Buddhist tradition a great soul reincarnated to lead the faithful may be identified when the subject is very young, leaving the young monk little choice but to assume the responsibility of leadership. Directors Moon Chang-yong and Jin Jeon have faithfully reflected this tradition in a film that is quietly respectful. Graceful and delicate but also funny at times the story charts the tender relationship between the very young Padma Angdu and his godfather and spiritual guide Urgan Rigzin who devotes his life to helping the young lama in his quest – to return to his Tibetan monastery from his Indian birthplace. The bond between them grows in strength and purity on the journey to Tibet as the young boy attempts to turn away from childhood and take up the mantle of Rinpoche or Precious One.

## THE BREADWINNER

Nora Twomey, Ireland, Canada, Luxembourg, 2017, 93'

This tale of a young Afghan girl who triumphs over bigotry and war is told in two interwoven animations that beautifully illustrate not only the courage of an oppressed people but also the culture of storytelling embedded in Afghan life. The young girl uses this cultural weapon of story as she struggles with the Taliban who have imprisoned her father, for being a teacher. She also respects the tenets of Islam, honours her family and deals honestly with those she meets on her path – all this while masquerading as a boy. Visually a delight, the animation glories in monsters, princes and natural splendour; appealing equally to young and old as the ancient fables are re-worked to sit alongside jet fighters and the Taliban in a sparkling parable from the Silk Road.

## THE CLEANERS

### IRISH PREMIERE

There is a perception that social media are uncensored platforms, open and apolitical. This idea may exist because there is almost everything out there one could imagine, from bacon lampshades to nose flute recitals. The truth is tens of thousands of moderators scan material 24/7 on social networks, each averaging 25,000 images per shift, making the snap judgement – delete or ignore. None of the big-hitters is directly involved, but sub-contract the work to companies based outside the US, in countries like the Philippines where hundreds of operators in booths, like battery hens, plough through porn, beheadings, crime scenes, bombings and other equally disturbing material on the internet, that can inflict secondary trauma... on the operators. Shot in a staccato style that could be called *tech-interrupted* the film is of momentous significance: who will tell me what I can watch in the future ... master?

## THE DEMINER

Hogir Hirori, Shinwar Kamal, Sweden, 2017, 83'

### IRISH PREMIERE

The stiff-legged gait of the man in fatigues cuts an almost comical figure as he moves across the rocky field. He scans the ground before slowly moving forward. He stops, reaches down, and grabs hold of a piece of wire – the detonator fuse. The man is the legendary Colonel Fakhir Berwari – The Deminer.

In the chaos following the US invasion of Iraq, Saddam's Ba'ath party faithful embarked on a desperate rearguard campaign that saw the car-bomb and the landmine enter Iraqi daily life. They were everywhere: in fields, on roads, footpaths, in gardens and booby-trapped in vehicles. The landmines, first made from cooking pots, became increasingly sophisticated and powerful. But Colonel Fakhir learnt fast too and this film is based on footage he shot with a camcorder to bear witness to this plague – that had already cost him a leg.

## EATING ANIMALS

Christopher Quinn, United States, 2017, 94'

### IRISH PREMIERE

Based on the book by Jonathan Safran Foer this extraordinary film by Christopher Quinn paints a picture of an America dominated by factory farming, an illusion of countryside pockmarked by massive barns, holding up to ten thousand pigs at a time; chicken runs that are almost entirely automated – hundreds of thousands of birds processed like bolts, or motorcar tyres or other material. Quinn looks at the genetic mutation that has given the world fatter more compliant factory-friendly animals through selective breeding and chemical interventions. But it wasn't always like this and archive takes us back to an era of a close partnership between farmers and the land. So where did it go wrong – the answer lies in a complex equation of money, population growth and scientific progression, but also in choices that we still have: just because one could breed a six-legged cow doesn't mean one should.

Produced by Quinn and Brad Pitt and narrated by Nicole Kidman, the documentary chronicles the extraordinary journey of three Sudanese Lost Boys - men who arrived in the United States after a 15 year migration through their war-torn country. Soon after his documentary's release, Christopher completed *21 Up America*, a longitudinal portrait executive produced by Michael Apted. Christopher went on to receive the Emerging Talent Award by the International Documentary Association.



## FAMILY SHOTS

David Sieveking, Germany, 2017, 95'

### IRISH PREMIERE

In the no-man's-land that divides the pro-vaccinators and anti-vaccinators there exists a complicated argument about live viruses, Big Pharma and the World Health Organisation. But for David and Jessica who are having a baby the choice is closer to home: their doctor wants Jessica to have a vaccination that would protect the unborn baby from neonatal tetanus. Jessica agrees but soon develops a violent reaction to the shot and so begins a journey that will take David halfway around the world in his quest to get to the bottom of the vaccination debate. It's a fascinating trail that ends in Guinea Bissau with a world authority whose many decades of field research has led to an astonishing conclusion that neither camp imagined.

## GENESIS 2.0

Christian Frei, Maxim Arbugaev, Switzerland, 2018, 113'



### IRISH PREMIERE

Director Christian Frei has skilfully brought together the ancient and the near future in a film that seeks to connect the bones of our prehistoric beginnings to the bespoke organisms that are now being created in labs around the world. Set in one part in the lunar-like tundra of the New Siberian Islands a motley band of hunters pursue mammoth tusks that can fetch a pretty price as ivory stock, while five thousand miles away bright young minds are genetically engineering new species to order. Frei juxtaposes the stark brooding beauty of the islands with the frenetic pace of bio-tech labs to answer the eternal question: Is the End really in the Beginning?


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#### Parental Guidance Note

He was nominated for an Academy Award with War Photographer (2001) and won the World Cinema Directing Award at Sundance with Space Tourists (2009). For his latest endeavor he reached out to Siberian filmmaker Maxim Arbugaev.

**Maxim Arbugaev** is a Russian director who grew up to be a professional ice hockey player. Discovering his passion for filmmaking in the solitude of the New Siberian Islands, he now studies documentary filmmaking at The Gerasimov Institute of Cinematography in Moscow.



## I, DOLOURS

Maurice Sweeney, Ireland, Northern Ireland, 2017, 82'

Saturday 21st, 8.15pm

In the big picture of Irish republicanism the lines are clear – colonial oppression was punctuated by huge events: 1921; Bloody Sunday; The Good Friday Agreement, and many others. But one forgets the continuous nature of struggle, linking generations. Maurice Sweeney's portrait of IRA volunteer Dolours Price examines the collective and the individual in a film that is courageously candid and beautifully shot. Using archive, interviews and re-creation Sweeney captures the ethos of her republican household in which... "We wouldn't hear Little Red Riding Hood as a story but rather, 'They hanged my mate Jimmy.'" Sweeney confronts head-on the issue of the disappeared – traitors to the cause who were eliminated; spectres in Dolours' life that would follow her to the grave. Seamlessly the narrative changes form and in taut re-creations the horror of solitary and force feeding is brought home. Sad, delicate and finely crafted – a major film.

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**Maurice Sweeney** has been regarded as one of Ireland's leading documentary filmmakers. In more recent years he has also begun to focus on fiction. As a director, Maurice has won four IFTAs. In 2010, he filmed and directed the widely acclaimed The Forgotten Irish, dealing with the emigration to Britain in the 1950s. Maurice's first major drama feature, Saving The Titanic, has been sold throughout the world. Watched by an estimated 10 million people the film won several prestigious awards.

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## THE IMAGE YOU MISSED

An Irish filmmaker, Donal Foreman, grapples with the legacy of his estranged father; the late legendary documentary filmmaker Arthur MacCaig. Donal has unearthed 30 years of unique and never-before-seen imagery – his father's comprehensive archive of the conflict in Northern Ireland. Donal's response, *The Image You Missed* is a documentary film that weaves together a history of the Northern Irish 'Troubles' with the story of a son's search for his father. In the process, the film creates a candid encounter between two filmmakers born into different political moments, revealing their contrasting experiences of Irish nationalism, the role of images in social struggle, and the competing claims of personal and political responsibility.

## ISLAND OF THE HUNGRY GHOSTS

Gabrielle Brady, Germany, UK, Australia, 2018, 94'

### IRISH PREMIERE

The spectacular migration of thousands of crabs across Christmas Island sets the scene for Gabrielle Brady's damning investigation into the plight of detained asylum seekers in Australia's most notorious detention camp. In taut, spare interactions therapist Poh Lin gently tugs at the tangled experiences the migrants hold, to unravel the complex world of the prisoners who've committed no crimes. But when it becomes clear that clinicians are being legally excluded from the process, the voices of the Hungry Ghosts speak to her. The spirits of mistreated Chinese labourers who died on the island murmur in eternal torment, echoing the tales of her patients who writhe in a similar Limbo. Clearly suffering secondary trauma, Poh Lin hangs on for as long as possible before she is forced to heed the Hungry Ghosts' warning.

Gabrielle studied Documentary Direction at the Cuban international film school (EICTV). Gabrielle has lived nomadically for the past ten years, traveling between Cuba, Mongolia, Indonesia, the Australian central desert and Europe. Her short film *ISLAND* was commissioned as part of the Guardian documentary series and premiered at Sheffield festival 2017. *Islands of the Hungry Ghosts* is her first feature film.



## JANE

Brett Morgen, USA, 2017, 90'

Using never-before-seen archive, director Brett Morgen has created the first comprehensive picture of the famous primatologist Jane Goodall, the young woman who left for Africa with no academic training, little funding and a seemingly naive trust that nature would not harm her: Unencumbered by formal qualifications, Goodall set about observing chimpanzee behaviour using criteria that would later give wildlife boffins a cadenza – no-one had used such human traits as reference points before, it was simply unheard of. Vindicated by her discovery of tool-making within chimp society, Goodall got a grant to photographically document this behaviour – enter Hugo van Lawick, the cinematographer who would later become her husband. Set in the unspoiled paradise of Gombe National Park, this relationship is a kind of Innocents in Eden love story, placing for the first time Goodall, the complete person, centre stage.

The family have never quite forgiven Aliona's mother for deserting the motherland but slowly warm to Aliona as she tries to piece together her mother's early life through photographs, letters and her aunts' testimonies. Complemented by the celebrated artist Simone Massi's exquisite hand-drawn animation this gently modulated family portrait digs deeply into the Russian psyche to reveal a stoic and resilient people.

Stephen Schible's portrait of legendary composer Ryuichi Sakamoto goes much deeper than the composer's fame for scores like *Merry Christmas Mr Lawrence*, *The Last Emperor* and *The Revenant*. Schible's film is huge – it overflies modern Japanese history, through Europe, to America and settles to fight a series of arguments through Sakamoto's music: progress versus tradition; risk versus stagnation; artefact versus prototype. But Sakamoto, now fighting cancer of the windpipe, has many times also stepped down from the podium to join protesters at the barricades on issues such as Japanese renuclearization after the Fukushima tragedy, the Iraq war and many other human rights violations. Defying doctors' orders to rest, the musician works with more urgency, plucking natural and man-made sounds from the environment, recombining them again and again until they gain a second life. Here we see, not his last, but his greatest work.

'PERFECT PITCH WORKSHOP'

**Making documentary**

**pitching different!**



In partnership with Screen Training Ireland, Guth Gafa presents 'Perfect Pitch', a pitching workshop with a difference for documentary filmmakers, who have a project they are working on, and who are looking for 'the perfect pitch', or who just wish to explore the many ways to achieve that 'perfect pitch'. While the traditional 'pitching forums' and 'pitching markets' have a strong reputation and an important place on the documentary circuit, they are highly competitive, and their numbers are restricted - for example, MeetMarket at Sheffield DocFest this year had over 500 submissions for 65 pitch slots.

At the 'Perfect Pitch' workshop, a new online platform, Pitch The Doc, will be presented. This platform proposes to change the playing field, as it will allow filmmakers to present, and decision-makers to view, a broad range of doc projects without the need for competing for a forum place, and without the challenge of pitching and responding to pitches in the 'gladiator arena' scenario, like HotDocs Forum or IDFA Forum.

The format of the workshop will be a presentation by the Pitch The Doc team, followed by 2 established international filmmakers, who have both pitched at the big international forums and/or markets, who will talk about their experiences, and consider the merits and values of the pitching forums/markets versus the online platform. Participants in the workshop will be involved in the discussions, and will have the opportunity to talk about their own individual pitches, and pitch strategies, with our experts.

Admission to the workshop is free, but tickets must be booked online. The workshop will take place on Sunday 22nd July at 12.30pm.

## WHAT'S ON YOUR PLATE? A FOOD FILM AND OPEN DISCUSSION

The stories behind what's actually on the plate of food you are eating are told with powerful effect in Christopher Quinn's absorbing documentary, **Eating Animals**. Narrated by Natalie Portman, the film takes a hard look at how agriculture now focuses on cheap efficiency, industrial-scale farming, and the lack of traditional farming methods. But it also raises questions for meat eaters and vegans alike:

Are all countries guilty of abusing animal rights? Ireland's identity is steeped in agriculture, the social and economic structures that regulate the society are strongly connected to the land and the scale of farming is completely different from that shown in **Eating Animals** – surely there is a

place in the world for such responsible animal husbandry?

Research into lab-created animal protein is ongoing – would the vegan lobby be willing to endorse this kind of nutritious 'meat' production?

With the world population set to peak at 10 billion – how on Earth will we feed the people?

To answer these and other questions there will be an extended discussion following the Saturday screening of **Eating Animals** with director, Christopher Quinn, food guru and cheesemonger, Kevin Sheridan, food ambassador and local producer, Olivia Duff, and Eamon Ryan, leader of The Green Party of Ireland.

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## COFFEE MORNINGS WITH THE FILMMAKERS

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

## GUTH GAFA HUMAN RIGHTS AWARD

Guth Gafa has as its founding principle: the promotion of human rights through the medium of documentary film. In recognition of exceptional work in this field an award is bestowed each year: a filmmaker or the subject of a film is honoured for their contribution to human rights.

Sadly this year's award is a posthumous honour, celebrating the extraordinary bravery of Colonel Fakhir Berwari of the Iraqi army who dedicated his life to lifting landmines. Following the overthrow of Saddam Hussein the country experienced a military backlash in which thousands of mines were planted and car-bombs set. With no bomb-squad to speak of, the colonel became an expert; self-taught he developed an intuitive understanding of explosives, a sixth sense that guided him. The man was truly fearless, even after a booby-trapped device blew his leg off – he became more determined, obsessed with ridding the land of the evil devices. He said:


*“If I fail, only I will die, but if I succeed, I can save many lives”.*

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## How To Book Your Tickets


